case an opening offered, to return, leaving it for  
others to explore more adventurous than ourselves.  
By getting into the water, which here was not two  
foot deep, and watching our opportunity between  
the swells, rushed our canoe to the shore and se-  
cured it above the reach of the surf. On examina-  
tion we found the beach to extend only about half  
way across the cavern, and turning, ran almost par-  
allel with its sides, giving about fifty feet in width  
of level surface entirely covered with fallen stalac-  
tite and innumerable fish bones. The other half is  
a continuation of the water portion, and along  
which sweeps, at intervals of a few seconds, the  
strange and ceaseless swell of water; and this is the  
character of the cave for nearly fifty rods further  
on, when the roof, by gradual depression, is brought  
down lower and lower, until it reaches the surface  
of the rolling swells, shutting off all further ad-  
vance.

Beyond this, it seems to be for a long distance  
level with the water of the cave, the under surface  
of which has been wrought by the action of the wa-  
ter or other causes, into irregular and many deep  
cavities, and it is this constant striking of the heavy  
swells against this cavernous roof that produces the  
varied sounds that are heard. At this place the  
roar is almost deafening, its violent twanging and  
hissing, as though, at intervals, water and air to-  
gether were forcibly driven through narrow aper-  
tures, and now and then a sound as though the  
word boom had been uttered with great power by  
nothing less than the mouth of a volcano far on in  
the gloom. The terrific darkness of the place, the  
occasional shrill cry from the mysterious occupants  
of the cavern, their senseless plunges, as we move  
from place to place, together with the immense ac-  
cumulation of the refuse of the finny tribe, all con-  
spire to render it, as it truly is, a cavern of darkness,  
of doubt, of terror and of mystery.
