

COLONIZING CHINESE.

A Land Scheme of Gigantic Proportions.

Fifteen Million Acres in Mexico.

Two San Franciscans to Raise Coffee, Indigo and Tea With Coolie Labor.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 9. — Wag Yin Wan, a wealthy San Francisco Chinese, who has associated with him Lyman I. Mowry, an attorney of the same city, both of whom are now here, have just purchased 15,000,000 acres of land on the isthmus of Tehuantepec, and will complete to-day the purchase of another large tract, on which coffee, indigo, tobacco and it is believed tea can be successfully grown. On the tracts large Chinese colonies will be established at once.

Wag Yin Wan and Mowry leave for China by way of San Francisco to-morrow for the purpose of sending out the first colonists. Owing to the heat the land has been neglected, but it is believed that the Chinese colonists will be able to stand the temperature, as it is very similar to that of China.

These colonies will be the first the Chinese have ever established in this country, and are to be without aid from the Federal Government. The home journals here decry the prospect of Chinese colonists for Mexico.

An Organized War on the Chinese Exclusion Act.

NEW YORK, July 9.—A first-class raid against Chinese exclusion seems to be on foot throughout the East. A fraudulent interview with the Chinese Minister on the subject is being made the excuse for attacks on California and the Pacific coast generally on account of its attitude on the Chinese question. Colonel Bee succeeded in having a special plea for the Chinese printed here. Wharton Barker, who was engaged with Count Mitkiewicz in securing alleged great concessions from China for a Philadelphia syndicate, also appears in a lengthy article to abuse the restriction acts. The majority of the Washington correspondents of the New York, Boston and Philadelphia papers to-day take a hand in spreading the idea that the restriction measures are unjustifiable and demagogical, and many papers in other sections of the East also seize the occasion to read the Pacific coast dwellers a lesson. Nothing like it has been seen in the East in years, and never since the Chinese Literary Bureau at Washington, San Francisco and New York went into the business of distorting facts concerning the Chinese question on the Pacific coast.
