

MORE CHARGES TO ANSWER.

A Prisoner With a Liking for Bread and Beer.

Some days ago Joseph Connors was arrested for disturbing the peace on Frederick street. Connors was recognized yesterday in the city prison as Frank Donnelly, who, prior to his arrest, whipped Henry Wolstein, a baker, because the latter interfered when Connors was robbing his bakery wagon. He was also recognized as the man who recently stole a barrel of beer from a First-street saloon.

AN EXPENSIVE BITE.

Thomas J. Owen Obtains Damages for Being Bitten by a Dog.

Judge Stafford gave his decision yesterday in a suit brought in the Justices' Court by Thomas J. Owen against Frey & Merkel, bakers on Larkin street, for \$299 as damages for the bite of a dog which belonged to the defendants. His honor, in giving his decision, stated that the evidence adduced proved that the dog was a vicious animal, and that it was dangerous to have it going about. He gave Owen \$100 damages and costs.

KWOK AH SIP.

Judge Hoffman Orders Her Return to China.

Judge Sawyer will render his decision in the case of Kwok Ah Sip, the Chinese damsel who wished to land on the plea of prior residence, claiming that she left this city on the Oceanic on December 21, 1881. Colonel Bee testified, and produced his records to back him, that no woman sailed on that date, and Judge Hoffman decided that San Francisco was not the proper abode for Kwok and accordingly ordered her back to China.
