

End of a Checkered Career

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Constance Muriel, who went East with the Fanny Buckingham troupe, reports the death at Chicago of Lincoln D. Wright, who played with the company under the name of L. D. Hood. Mr. Wright was a relative of Governor Kinkead of Nevada, and was well known on the Comstock for his artistic ability. He was connected with journalism for a time, and made his career more checkered by officiating at one time as clerk in the Palace Hotel. Peritonitis was the cause of his death.

Care of Sick Chinese.

It is stated that Colonel Bee, the Chinese Consul, intends to determine by a resort to law whether the city and county cannot be compelled to care for diseased Chinamen as well as the people of other nationalities. The reason for this determination was the refusal of Police Surgeon J. J. Clark yesterday to admit to the city receiving hospital a Celestial leper who was arrested yesterday morning.

Jaeger appeal case.

An appeal to the Supreme Court has been perfected in the cases of Shem Ah Fook and Wong Ah Tie. They are two Chinese who, in February last, in the Superior Court of Fresno county were found guilty of murder in the first degree and sentenced to life imprisonment for the fatal stabbing on the 21st of last November of Nathan L. Bashman, a gardener near Middleton, on the San Joaquin river.
